The 9 Protected Characteristics

Under the Equality Act 2010 we have the right not to be discriminated against because of:

- Age
- Disability
- Gender reassignment
- Marriage and civil partnership
- Pregnancy and maternity
- Race
- Religion or belief
- Sex
- Sexual orientation.

'Discrimination' includes indirect discrimination, harassment and victimisation. Universities have a positive duty to eliminate discrimination and advance equality of opportunity.
